

This guide should help you talk to your Retina Specialist about your wet age-related macular degeneration (or wet AMD) and treatment with **LUCENTIS**. A Retina Specialist focuses on treating wet AMD and will provide the level of care you need.

PREPARE FOR YOUR NEXT APPOINTMENT

- **PLAN AHEAD.** Put together a list of questions you may have. Some suggestions are included in this guide for you.

- **FEEL CONFIDENT ABOUT YOUR TREATMENT.** To make the choices that are right for you, make sure you get all the information you can.
- **KEEP COMMUNICATING.** If you experience any changes in your vision, tell your Retina Specialist right away.

Who is LUCENTIS for?

LUCENTIS[®] (**ranibizumab injection**) is a prescription medicine for the treatment of patients with Wet Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD).

What important safety information should I know about LUCENTIS?

LUCENTIS is a prescription medication given by injection into the eye, and it has side effects. Some **LUCENTIS** patients have had detached retinas and serious eye infections. **LUCENTIS** should not be used in patients who have an infection in or around the eye or are allergic to **LUCENTIS** or any of its ingredients. **LUCENTIS** patients have had increases in eye pressure within 1 hour of an injection. Serious side effects also include inflammation inside the eye, and rarely, problems related to the injection procedure, such as cataracts. Although not common, some **LUCENTIS** patients have had strokes or heart attacks. If your eye becomes red, sensitive to light, painful, or has a change in vision, you should call or visit your eye doctor right away. Ask your doctor if you have questions or want more information.
